From the

President, Chief Executive Officer & Treasurer

The last financial year has been a year where being agile and open to opportunity have been key to a very successful year. We have also been very fortunate to be living in Western Australia and not be as challenged by COVID lockdowns as the other state associations.

At the forefront of everything we do is the wellbeing of our MND community and how we can improve the quality of life of people living with MND and their family carers. Our strategic plan is updated every year and new gaps in service are identified. It's the CEO's job, supported by the Board to try and fill these gaps either by partnering with other organizations or adding services through MNDAWA.

This financial year we have added to the team a respiratory physiotherapist (Vivienne) and a second occupational therapist (Terrie). Our thanks to the McCusker Charitable Foundation for providing the first year funding for our respiratory physiotherapist.

We continue along with the other state associations to advocate for people over the age of 65 years to "make aged care fair". NDIS is complex and sometimes frustrating but people over the age of 65 will receive on average only one tenth of the funding that a person with a NDIS plan will receive and the wait times for aged care packages are unacceptably long. Our aim for this coming year is to concentrate our efforts on funding therapy services to the over 65's.

We have continued delivering our successful educational program to health professionals as well as delivering an advance care planning workshop to families and their service providers. We aimed to strengthen the support of our family carers through having their needs assessed regularly and addressed in a timely way and developing an on-line carer information and support toolkit. Our families continue to benefit from free access to grief counselling. We have also reached out to specialist palliative care services to improve our clients' access to palliative care.

We very much value the support we get from the WA Department of Health. This funding is around 35% of our total revenues. The rest comes from fundraising, donations, bequests and successful grant applications. We would like to pay particular thanks to a number of our funding partners: to Lotterywest, who gave us \$37,526 to fund the purchase of telehealth and video conferencing equipment; The WA Department of Health grant of \$121,105 to fund a review which will help us to " future proof" the association and plan for long term sustainability: The Theodore and Isabella Wearne foundation who funded the purchase of a pool vehicle costing \$19,000; and The Scottish Masonic Foundation for their grant of \$20,000 to purchase much needed equipment. We very much value our ongoing partnership with FightMND and Care Cure Support for the equipment they have funded over the last few vears.

Thanks largely to our dynamic Fundraising Manager and the good will of the WA public we have had a very successful year. The Walk to D'Feet, Dive For Dollars, Cape to Cape and the MND Ball all hit new records in terms of funds raised but more importantly raised the profile of MNDAWA and people we serve as well as being an opportunity to have fun and enjoy the company of our MND community.

We would like to thank the Board for their help and support in what has been a challenging but very successful year and for our staff who continue to deliver our increased range of services and supports in a professional, competent and compassionate way.

Last but not least, we would like to say a huge thank you to our supporters, volunteers, donors and the wider MND Community. What you do is the reason we do what we do!

Operating Result

The net profit for the year ended 30 June 2021 amounted to \$488,470.

Significant Change in the State of Affairs

The 2021 financial year saw the association return to a more normal economic performance and activity from the previous year. During the 2020 financial year the association was impacted by the COVID-19 pandemic, with the main economic impact being in the fundraising area as a number of fundraising activities had to be cancelled.

This year there has been much more activity in donations and fundraising with income increasing from \$241,737 in 2020 to \$484,954. In addition, the association was eligible to receive government assistance in relation to the financial impact of COVID-19 and an amount of \$152,035 has been reflected in the profit and loss statement.

The principal activities of the association during the financial year were to provide guidance and support services to those diagnosed with motor neurone disease and their families in Western Australia.

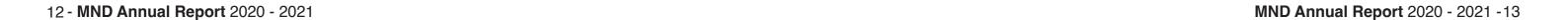

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2021

Note 1: Statement of significant accounting policies

Financial reporting framework

The financial statements are special purpose financial statements prepared in order to satisfy the financial reporting requirements of the Associations Incorporation Act Western Australia. The board has determined that the association is not a reporting entity.

Statement of compliance

The financial report has been prepared in accordance with Associations Incorporation Act Western Australia, the basis of accounting specified by all Australian Accounting Standards and Interpretations, and the disclosure requirements of Accounting Standards AASB 101: Presentation of Financial Statements, AASB 107: Cash Flow Statements, AASB 108: Accounting Policies, Changes in Accounting Estimates and Errors, AASB 1031: Materiality and AASB 1054: Australian Additional Disclosures.

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on an accrual basis and are based on historical costs. They do not take into account changing money values or, except where stated specifically, current valuations of non-current assets.

The following significant accounting policies, which are consistent with the previous period unless stated otherwise, have been adopted in the preparation of these financial statements.

(a) Income tax

No provision for income tax has been raised as the association is exempt from income tax under Division 50 of the Income Tax Assessment Act 1997.

(b) Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment is carried at cost less, where applicable, any accumulated depreciation.

The depreciable amount of all property, plant and equipment is depreciated over the useful lives of the assets to the association commencing from the time the asset was held ready for use.

Leasehold improvements are depreciated over the shorter of either the unexpired period of the lease of the estimated useful lives of the improvements.

Note 1: Statement of significant accounting policies (continued)

(c) Impairment of assets

At the end of each reporting period, the board reviews the carrying amounts of its assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have been impaired. If such indication exists, an impairment test is carried out on the asset by comparing the recoverable amount of the asset, being the higher of the assets fair value less costs of disposal and value in use, to the asset's carrying amount. Any excess of the asset's carrying amount over its recoverable amount is recognised in the income and expenditure statement.

(d) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand, deposits held at call with banks, and other short term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less.

(e) Accounts receivable and other debtors

Accounts receivable and other debtors includes amounts due from funders as well as amounts receivable from customers. Receivable expected to be collected within 12 months of the end of the reporting period are classified as current assets. All other receivable are classified as non-current assets.

(f) Revenue and other income

Interest revenue is recognised using the effective interest method, which for floating rate financial assets is the rate inherent in the instrument. Dividend revenue is recognised when the right to receive a dividend has been established.

Grant and donation income is recognised when the entity obtains control over the funds, which is generally at the time of receipt.

If conditions are attached to the grant that must be satisfied before the association is eligible to receive the contribution, recognition of the grant as revenue will be deferred until those conditions are satisfied.

All revenue is stated net of the amount of goods and services tax.

(g) Goods and services tax (GST)

Revenues, expenses and assets are recognised net of the amount of GST, except where the amount of GST incurred is not recoverable from the Australia Taxation Office (ATO). Receivables and payables are stated inclusive of the amount of GST receivable or payable. The net amount of GST recoverable from, or payable to, the ATO is included with other receivables or payables in the assets and liabilities statement.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2021

Note 1: Statement of significant accounting policies (continued)

(h) Accounts payable and other payables

Accounts payable and other payables represent the liability outstanding at the end of the reporting period for goods and services received by the association during the reporting period that remain unpaid. The balance is recognised as a current liability with the amounts normally paid within 30 days or recognition of the liability.

(i) Employee provisions

Provision is made for the association's liability for employee benefits arising from services rendered by employees to the end of the reporting period. Employee provisions have been measured at the amounts expected to be paid when the liability is settled.

(j) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the association has a legal or constructive obligation, as a result of past events, for which it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will result and that outflow can be reliably measured. Provisions are measured at the best estimate of the amounts required to settle the obligation at the end of the reporting period.

Report on the Financial Report

Opinion
